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Rats' Ability to Run after Spinal Cord Injury Captures World Headlines

New research by Reggie Edgerton, a professor of neurobiology at the David Geffen School of Medicine at UCLA, that enabled paralyzed rats to run again after spinal cord injury, was covered Sept. 20 by The
