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#### About the Speaker

Carol Warnes, MD, is a Professor of Medicine and a consultant in cardiovascular diseases, internal medicine, and pediatric cardiology at Mayo Clinic in Rochester, MN. She was the first woman to join the Cardiovascular Division at Mayo Clinic in 1987, where she began the ACHD Clinic, of which she is the director. She received her medical degree from Newcastle upon Tyne in England where she completed her general medical training before going to London to pursue cardiology fellowships. She completed her post-graduate thesis at the National Institutes of Health before returning to the National Heart Hospital in London for another two years.

At Mayo Clinic, Dr. Warnes received the Henry S. Plummer Distinguished Physician Award in 2004 and eight Cardiovascular Teacher of the Year Awards. She became a fellow of the Royal College of Physicians in 2005, and is on the ACC Board of Trustees. She received ACHA's Heart Heroes Leadership Award in 2008. She also co-chaired the ACC/AHA Guidelines for the Management of Adult Congenital Heart Disease in 2008 and has edited three books and published over 150 manuscripts. She is currently on the Editorial Board of *Circulation*.
